We are all born with abilities, and we choose to display certain attributes. Discuss the difference between abilities and attributes and why one is chosen while the other is not. What are some attributes of a Godly leader?

Romans 6:13; Romans 12:2; Titus 1:7-9; James 3:1

Four Attributes Displayed by Moses.

1. Knowing your identity. Knowing your identity means defining who you really are instead of who society says you should be. What are the dangers of getting your identity from others? What message does it send to God?

Jeremiah 1:5; Romans 12:6-8; 1 Corinthians 12:27; Ephesians 4:22-24

2. Accepting responsibility. Leaders don't make excuses; when they see a problem, they solve it. Why do we make excuses? In the long-term, is this really an easier way to deal with problems?

Proverbs 10:4; 1 Corinthians 3:8; Galatians 5:13; James 1:22-25

3. Setting priorities. Our core values determine our decisions and priorities. What are five core values you want to embody as a leader?

Proverbs 19:1; Matthew 7:12; Philippians 3:8-11

4. Focusing on eternity. Explain the difference between line-focused and dot-focused thinking. How do we exercise line-focused thinking in our spiritual life to work together with our core values?

Proverbs 21:5; 1 Corinthians 9:26; Colossians 3:1-2
